General Rules for the Horticultural Section:

- Exhibitors must be members of the Pontiac Agricultural Society.
- Entries should be brought to the Exhibition Hall to be placed for exhibiting Wednesday, August 27, 2025 between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Judging to commence Thursday, August 28, 2025 at 9:00 a.m., and only the show committee can be present during judging. The decisions of the judge(s) are final, based on the accepted guidelines contained in the Ontario Judging Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design, Publication #34, 2003 edition. No exhibit is entitled to a prize unless worthy. Entries must be picked up Monday, September 1, 2025 between 3:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. Entries cannot be removed before this time. If entries are removed before the designated time no prize money can be awarded.
- Prepare your entry form(s) and entry tags (to be obtained from the Fair office) at home as you prepare your entries for showing. List your entries on the entry form and complete an entry tag with your name and exhibitor's number and securely attach the tag with string or rubber bands (not taped) to the exhibit.
- Exhibitor supplies their own containers, suggestions are clear vases, bottles, canning jars, etc., please avoid Styrofoam cups. Please do not use any container of value.
- Horticultural exhibits (specimen cut flowers, potted plants and specials collections, displays & planters) must have been grown by the exhibitor and should be correctly labeled with plant name and variety using botanical &/or common name, whenever possible. Any class description with "NIP" represents Named if Possible.

- Prepare and condition all plant material promoting long-lasting turgidity and freshness for the duration of the Fair.
- Grooming remove any soil, spray residue, insect remains, damaged or dead florets or leaves, etc. from the specimen. Remove all foliage, leaves which may be underwater in the container as this causes decay and bacteria in the water. Container-grown plants should have a clean soil surface and container.
- Pontiac Agricultural Society, its Directors, Officers, Show Committee and Employees will take all reasonable precautions to ensure safety of the exhibits, but they cannot be responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged articles, however caused.
- Only one entry per exhibitor to a class, except in "any other" (A.O.V.) class, where any number of entries may be shown provided the exhibits are of different plants and no class is listed in the schedule for the plant. No sub-divisions are permitted for any class, regardless of the number of entries.
- When any flower show exhibit has been specially chosen by any Pontiac Agricultural Society board member to be used for display purposes at the special Fair events, a special bonus will be paid.
 These exhibits will be removed from the flower show tables and replaced with a sign indicating the exhibit was chosen for display purposes.

SECTION A - SPECIMEN CUT FLOWERS

Rules for Specimen Cut Flowers:

An entry in a class specifying a certain number of blooms, stems, etc. must be shown as specified. A bud showing colour is considered to be a bloom. Note: For Gladiolus and other tall cuts, please use a sturdy non-tippy container.

- Cultivar (cultivated variety) = named variations of plant species, e.g. Rose 'Peace', 'Peace' is the cultivar (variation) of the species Rose.
- Bloom = individual flower, one to a stem; buds showing colour will be considered a bloom buds should be removed.

- Spike = a thick upright stem carrying several flowers which are nearly stemless, usually short pedicel, e.g. gladiolus, delphinium, snapdragon.
- Spray = a portion of the plant with a number of flowers on one stem. Ideally it would show all forms (stages of bloom), e.g. flowers in open bloom, buds showing colour, green buds and leaves.
- Stem or Stalk = a main plant structure which supports flowers, buds, leaves or fruit. It may be branched and may have multiple flowers on a stem, such as cosmos, rudbeckia, etc.

"NIP" = Named if possible.

- 13. Delphinium, 1 spike
- 14. Fern, 1 cultivar, 3 stems
- 15. Flowering Cabbage or Kale, 1 head
- 16. Flowering or fruited branch, not to exceed 24" above the container top, 1 branch
- 17. Foliage branch, colourful, not to exceed 24" above the container top, 1 branch
- 18. Geranium (Pelargonium), 1 stem
- 19. Gladiolus, 1 spike, any colour
- 20. Gladiolus, 2 spikes, one colour
- 21. Gladiolus, 3 spikes, each a different colour

- 22. Hollyhock (Alcea), not to exceed 24" above the container top, 1 stem
- 23. Hosta blooms with own foliage, 1 stem of bloom
- 24. Hosta leaves, leaf size 3" or wider, variegated leaf, NIP, 3 leaves
- 25. Hosta leaves, leaf size 3" or wider, any other coloured leaf, NIP, 3 leaves
- 26. Hosta leaves, leaf size up to 3" wide, one cultivar, NIP, 3 leaves
- 27. Hydrangea Flower Heads, ball shaped bloom, any cultivar(s), NIP, 2 stems
- 28. Hydrangea Flower Heads, cone shaped bloom, any cultivar(s), NIP. 2 stems
- 29. Lavatera (annual Mallow), 3 stems
- 30. Liatris (GayFeather) (Blazing Star), 3 spikes
- 31. Marigold (Tagetes), under 2" bloom, 3 stems
- 32. Marigold (Tagetes), 2" and over bloom, 3 stems
- 33. Ornamental grass, growth habit under 36", NIP, 5 stems
- 34. Ornamental grass, growth habit 36" and over, NIP, 3 stems
- 35. Pansy or Viola, with attached foliage, 5 stems
- 36. Petunia, semi-double or double bloom, 3 sprays
- 37. Petunia, single bloom, 3 sprays
- 38. Phlox, any cultivar(s), 1 stem
- 39. Rose, fully open bloom floating in a dish, without foliage, NIP, 1 bloom
- 40. Rose, miniature, NIP, 1 stem
- 41. Rose, miniature, NIP, 1 spray
- 42. Rose, any cultivar other than miniature, NIP, 1 stem
- 43. Rose, any cultivar other than miniature, NIP, 1 spray
- 44. Rudbeckia, any cultivar(s), 1 stem
- 45. Salvia, any cultivar(s), 3 stems
- 46. Sedum (Stonecrop), large clustered bloom heads, example Autumn Joy, 1 stem
- 47. Sedum, small clustered bloom heads, any other cultivar, 3 stems
- 48. Snapdragon (Antirrhinum), 3 stems
- 49. Straw Flower (Helichrysum), fresh blooms, 5 stems
- 50. Sunflower (Helianthus), any cultivar, bloom not to exceed 6", 1 stem
- 51. Sweet Peas, 3 stems
- 52. Zinnia, bloom under 3", 3 stems
- 53. Zinnia, bloom 3" and over, 3 stems
- 54. "What is New in the Garden" any new plant/plant variety, not

listed, 1-3 stems or spray

55. Any other bulb, corm, tuber or rhizone, NIP, 1-3 stems

56. Any other annual, NIP, 1-3 stems

57. Any other perennial, in bloom, NIP, 1-3 stems

58. Fresh seed pods or seed heads, NIP, 3 stems

SECTION B - POTTED PLANTS

Rules for Potted Plants:

Potted house plants must be grown by the exhibitor for at least three (3) months prior to showing. Please remove all outside decorative pot covers.

SECTION C

SPECIAL DISPLAYS, COLLECTIONS & PLANTERS

Rules for Displays, Collections & Planters:

Must be grown by the Exhibitor. Planters containing multiple plants must be arranged by the exhibitor and grown together at least three (3) weeks before showing.

- Display = a number of specimens exhibited (usually a minimum of 3 different {species/cultivars} plants/varieties) for artistic effect as well as cultural perfection.
- Planter = a number of different kinds of plants artistically grouped growing in a single open container for either indoors or outdoors.

74. Display of cut garden flowers, minimum 5 species, named

75. Display of cut foliage, minimum 5 species, named

SECTION D - DECORATIVE FLOWER DESIGNS

Rules for Decorative Flower Designs:

All design exhibits must contain fresh plant materials, unless otherwise specified. Flowers and other materials used in design

classes can be obtained from any source; the material does not necessarily have to be grown by the exhibitor. Accessories are permitted. No soil is permitted in decorative classes. An exhibitor may show one design per class.

JUNIOR CLASSES

Junior Classes:

Classes are divided into age groups. The age groups are - Exhibitors ages 5 to 9 and ages 10 to 16, as of September 30, 2025. Exhibitors in the Junior Classes must have a Junior exhibitor number (obtained from the Fair office). The exhibitor number must be written on the entry form and entry tag along with your name and age; and securely attached to the exhibit. The entry tag must be securely attached with string or rubber bands (not taped) to the exhibit. Juniors under the age of five (5) may enter into these classes if they wish, but they must obtain the exhibitor's number. A junior may receive help from an adult for their exhibits, however, please encourage the junior to use

their own ideas and creativity to experience the learning by doing in Horticulture.
